NWMT also publishes a bi-annual newsletter that is sent to every Resident Owned Community (ROC) household in Montana to keep you informed and connected with your peers across the state. Not only do you have your fellow Montana ROCs to learn from and grow with, but you're also part of a large network of over 300 ROCs in the United States!

Technical Assistance

When ROCs are organized, they enter into an agreement with NWMT called a CTAP Agreement. This agreement stays in effect for ten years or the life of the loan, whichever is greater. With this agreement, NWMT agrees to provide technical assistance to the ROC as part of the ROC USA Network.

Step-by-step technical assistance:

Pre-Purchase

Technical assistance & training through the purchase process.



Post-Purchase

Developing budgets & capital improvement plans. Help with policies and procedures.



Training

Education and training for members & leaders.



Compliance

Assistance with loan compliance, grant covenants, and terms as applicable.



Connections

Access to other residents of ROCs in Montana and the entire ROC Network.






You Are a Part of Something **GREAT!**

Financial Coaching

Through your partnership with NeighborWorks Montana, you have access to statewide financial coaches who may be able to support you and your family in a few different ways.

Meeting with a financial coach is entirely free! You also have the option to meet with a coach virtually, so travel is not necessary.

Low Cost Home Improvement Loans

Provided in partnership with NWMT, MoFi, a nonprofit that has been serving Montana since 1986, offers low-cost loans of up to \$10,000 to help you fix your manufactured home. MoFi charges 1% interest with no fees, and payment plans are structured to fit your monthly budget.
